This 12-month part-time course is designed to fulfil the requirements for admission to the examination for the Diploma in the Medical Care of Catastrophes (DMCC)

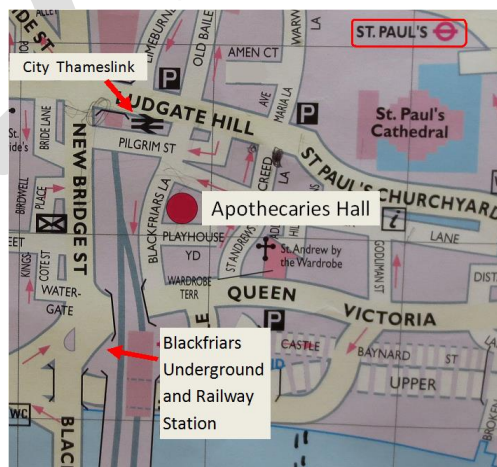
The course is taught on Saturdays (usually one Saturday in each month). at the Hall of the Society of Apothecaries in Blackfriars, London. The dates given in this timetable are those on which the course will run. The topics are provisionally allocated to these dates, but the final timetable is likely to differ due to availability of lecturers.

N.B. We always try to follow the published timetable during the year as far as is possible. However, many of those who lecture on the course are active workers in humanitarian aid or are serving members of the armed forces. They may be posted abroad at short notice and this will lead to changes in the timetable. We will endeavour to inform the members of the course by email when this occurs, but nevertheless you are advised to check the timetable at regular intervals to ensure you are aware of any changes that may have been made.

There are refreshment breaks of 15 minutes during the morning and the afternoon teaching sessions. The lunch break is normally one hour but may be shortened slightly due to time pressures. (On a few special occasions lunch may be provided, but normally you will need to provide your own. There are many shops near the Hall where food can be obtained).

The syllabus for the course can be found on this website. It is divided into six sections and it should be noted that the material included in most of the teaching sessions will be drawn from more than one of the sections.
