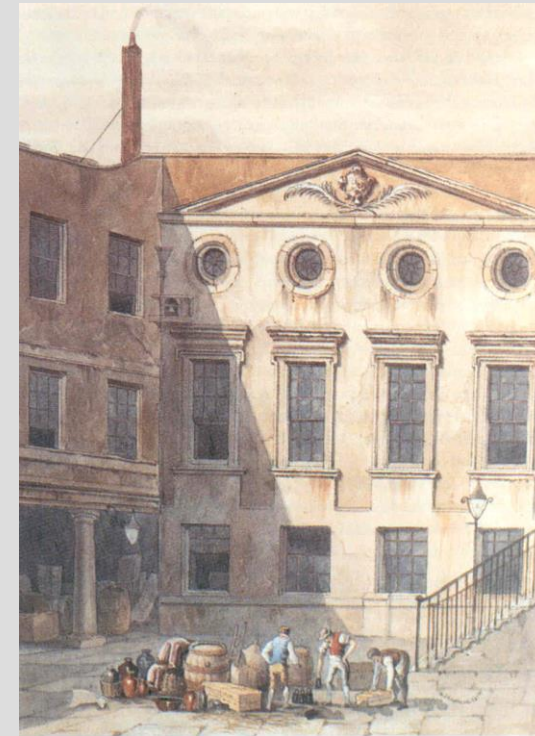

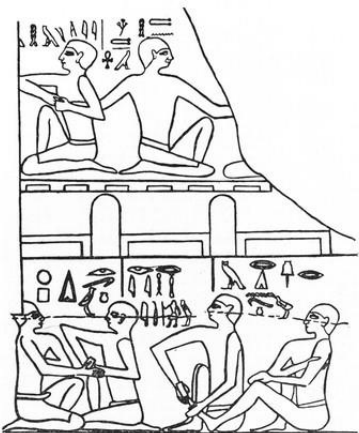

INTRODUCTION TO THE COURSE

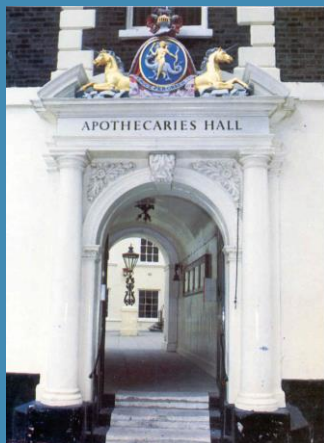
COURSE AIMS

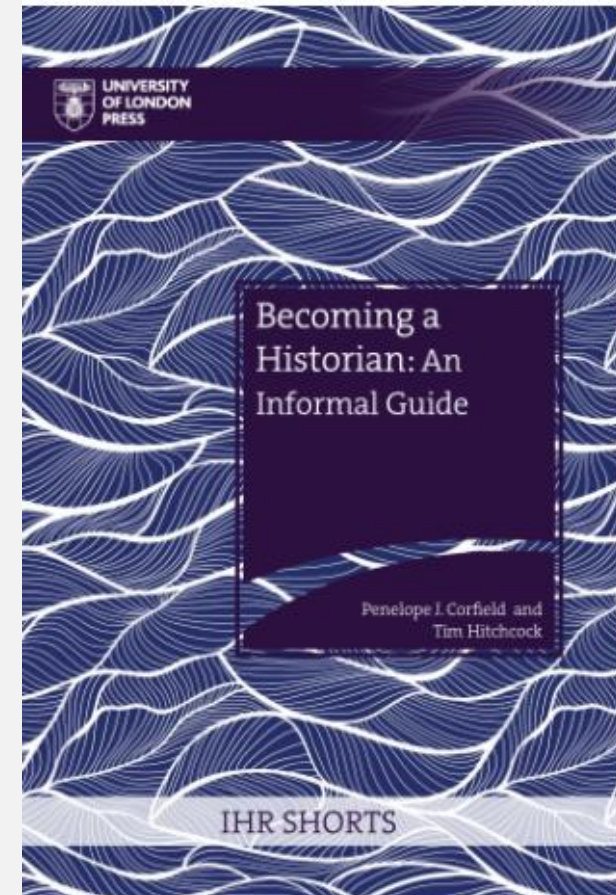
CORE READING SUGGESTIONS
